Learning the power of purpose from a feeble, broken man

As an apparent gift from a neighboring nursing facility, I welcomed R.C. Gaines as the first resident I ever admitted starting my career as an administrator in 1990. Unfortunately, it was another rejection from society for R.C. as he had experienced many times before.


He had no means to pay his rent, no education and no particular skill set. With his decrepit health status, he barely met criteria for staying in his new location. I learned R.C. had a difficult life living in the same town, never graduating from school. He never held a job. He fell into alcoholism and drugs early in life and ended up homeless on the streets of a small rural town.

We worked diligently together over the next few months, strengthening his physical ability and navigating the Social Security system to overcome his greatest challenges. As he gained strength, I realized R.C.'s greatest attribute was his willingness to serve.

He started to help pass meal trays to the other residents in the facility, take out the trash, fold laundry and scatter salt on sidewalks in the winter. We talked about life and family and God. Soon I called him a friend.

As time passed, his servanthood began to reach back to the community for others. He would buy groceries for shut-ins and oh-so-slowly deliver them to their apartments. Understanding the harshness of life, he would visit and assist homeless men on the streets he used to lay in himself. If the chamber of commerce in that small town would have had a Volunteer of the Year award, he would've received it, I am sure

It was from that feeble broken man who I learned the power of purpose. The work or chores he began doing provided him with a sense of purpose. That purpose corresponded to self-value. He saw the value he was providing to other aged and disabled around him. That worthwhile work for others, coupled with his newfound purpose, fueled a passion for him to continue throughout the years. Isn't that what we all

strive for in our lives?

The 1970's song titled "He's Not Heavy, He's My Brother" comes to mind every time I see the American Legion color guard marching in a parade or presenting the flags at a memorial event. I consider how heavy those flags and rifles must get after hours of holding them at ready. It is that same passion that drives them to represent the colors in the heat and in the cold. They believe in the purpose that those flags represent, and I am glad they do ... for all of us.

These three attributes of purpose, worthwhile work and passion are what drives us in our mission to care for our veterans. We have so many staff members on this campus who have these same attributes. It is revealed in their everyday relationships with their coworkers and those we care for.

I salute our staff members who truly place service over self every day. It is through that commitment to others that you make a difference every day in the lives of those we are honored to serve.

BUILT TO ORDER

Progress made on two new IVHQ buildings

Construction continues to make noticeable progress both inside and out. Waterproofing and window installation is nearing completion, and brick and mortar continues to be laid on the west side of the building. The inside is also taking shape, with the entire Domiciliary being framed with backing support installed inside the walls. Sheet rock has begun on the lower two levels, allowing the space to quickly appear recognizable. The Domiciliary is still on track to be complete this fall.

The long-term care building seems to get larger in size each day. The lower two levels are being framed, and electrical and sprinkler conduits appear to be in place. The back of house operations in the basement will become visible soon with sheet rock and wall covering in the dietary and pharmacy beginning in April.

The building progress is only eclipsed by the amount of trenching and boring being completed on campus. A new potable water loop is being installed to provide fresh water to the campus in brand new pipe.



TOWER TOPPLED

The water tower was erected on one of the highest points on campus. It had a capacity of 300,000 gallons and stood 145 feet tall. At the time, the spherical water tower cost the home \$112,603 to construct. The home hoped to increase water pressure by installing such a tower and connecting it to the power plant to serve as a cooling tank.

The tower was erected using a new method to hoist the materials into the air — a basket rather than a gin pole. Many residents came to watch and help oversee the construction of the water tower.

The water system came under attack after an outbreak of Legionnaires' disease in 2015. The Rebuild Illinois Program, a \$300 million project, led to the demolishment of older structures — Elmore Infirmary, Fletcher Infirmary, Kent Infirmary and the Guest House — to make room for an independent living building and 250-bed skilled nursing facility. The program also made multiple infrastructure improvements to the campus, including negating the need to continue to maintain the water tower.

The water tower was taken down in January 2023. Crews cut the large holding tank into manageable portions and then lowered them to the ground with the use of a crane. The legs, or mains, were removed piece by piece. Demolition took several weeks with the winter weather.


STOCKING THE LAKE



Fishing in Lake Illinois this summer will be more fun thanks to the Illinois Department of Natural Resources. DNR officials removed every fish from the lake in August, taking them to the lake at Moorman Park or the Mississippi River. They lowered the lake water level and treated the lake with an algae killer. The water level then was brought back up, and on Sept. 20 (with several residents in attendance), the lake was filled with 90-100 channel catfish (1-2 pounds, some close to 3 pounds), 500 hand-sized bluegill, 30 red ear sunfish and 10 albino channel catfish. About two weeks later, 10 pounds of minnow were added as a food source for the new fish.
