★ Message from IDVA Director Terry Prince



Spring has arrived in a flash and what a busy month it has been. Recently, I attended the National Association of State Directors of Veterans Affairs (NASDVA) conference in Washington, DC, where I was honored to be elected its president, the first president from Illinois since Homer G. Bradley in 1948, the year NASDVA was founded. NASDVA members represent all fifty states, the District of Columbia, American Samoa, Guam, Northern Mariana Islands, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands. It is a powerful force advocating for veterans across the nation.

As president, one of my first official duties was to testify before the Joint House/Senate Committee on Veterans Affairs, alongside the Paralyzed Veterans of America, AMVETS, Wounded Warrior Project, Tragedy Assistance Program for Survivors, National Guard Association of the United States, and Mission Roll Call. We shared a unified message to Congress to elevate support for issues impacting veterans, and this year, there was a big focus on women veterans, the fastest-growing population of veterans. We testified about the importance of expanding health care designated specifically for women veterans.

I'm thankful for the opportunity Governor Pritzker has given me to lead IDVA, and I am humbled to be a part of an organization where the unified voice of NASDVA serves as a powerful beacon of hope in the hearts and minds of those we are privileged to serve.

My colleagues; Andrew Tangen, the Superintendent of the Veterans Assistance Commission of Lake County, and U.S. Navy veteran, is also the President of the National Association of County Veteran Service Officers (NACVSO). Additionally, Jen Solum, Superintendent of the Will County Veterans Assistance Commission and veteran of the U.S. Air Force, was recently elected as President of the Illinois Association of County Veterans Assistance Commissions. Andrew and Jen are fearless leaders who look out for the best interests of veterans at every turn. As you can see, Illinois is well represented in leadership advocating for veterans across the state and nation.

I hope you dig into this issue to see all of the exciting things happening for veterans and their families in Illinois.

Education


The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs withdrew its appeal of the Supreme Court ruling in favor of Army veteran James Rudsill, creating an opportunity for 1.2 million veterans to receive educational benefits. As reported by the USDVA website: "On April 16, 2024 the [Supreme Court of the United States decided](#) that if you served at least two periods of service, one that qualifies for the Montgomery GI Bill (MGIB) and another that qualifies for the Post-9/11 GI Bill (PGIB), you may be able to receive both benefits for up to 48-months of entitlement.

Since that announcement, the [United States Court of Appeals for Veterans Claims' decided in Perkins v. Collins](#) that Veterans who served for a single obligated period of sufficient length could also be eligible for two different education programs based on different months and days of service within that single obligated period."

From Service to Success: Donka's Operation Brighter Futures

For nearly four decades, Donka, Inc. has helped veterans and individuals with disabilities gain the skills needed to thrive in today's technology-driven workforce. As one of the only organizations in its region offering 1:1 computer training and job placement services, Donka provides veterans with the support they need to successfully transition into new careers.

Through its Operation Brighter Futures program, Donka delivers comprehensive training designed specifically for veterans, including those navigating disabilities and other post-service barriers. Supported by funding from the Illinois Veterans' Cash Grant Program, Donka provides computer skills training, job readiness preparation, and job placement services at no cost to participating veterans. Students begin with Donka's Computer Basics course, where they build essential digital skills using the Microsoft 365 suite. The course is approved by the Illinois Board of Higher Education and is also available to eligible veterans using VA education benefits/GI Bill.

"We are deeply grateful for Shannon Shymansky's support of Donka," said Executive Director Leanne Vos. "Her advocacy through the Illinois Department of Veteran Affairs helps connect veterans with the opportunities and services they have earned and deserve."

Donka student and veteran, Kevin Sullivan, shared, "Donka made learning possible for someone like me. I gained skills I can put on a resume, built confidence, and now feel more capable in a digital world."

Women's History Month



March is nationally recognized as Women's History Month, dedicated to celebrating the vital contributions women have made to our nation's history, culture, and progress. For the Illinois Department of Veterans Affairs Women Veterans Program, it provides a meaningful opportunity to recognize and honor the courage, leadership, and service of the women who have worn our nation's uniform.

The origins of Women's History Month date back to 1981, when Congress first established "Women's History Week", to coincide with International Women's Day on March 8th. In 1987, the observance expanded to the entire month to reflect on the achievements of women throughout American history and recognize their impact in every field, including military service.

Women have served in America's military since the Revolutionary War, often overcoming barriers while demonstrating exceptional resilience and dedication. Today, women continue to play an increasingly vital role in defending our nation. Nationally, more than 2.1 million women veterans live in the United States, and women are now the fastest-growing group within the veteran population.

Illinois is home to nearly 55,000 women veterans, representing about 10 percent of the state's veteran population, and that number continues to grow each year. Their service spans every branch of the military and every mission area – from combat operations and aviation to intelligence, logistics, medicine, and leadership roles.

This Women's History Month, the Illinois Department of Veterans Affairs Women Veterans Program, as featured in the previous article, recognized the outstanding leadership and service of women veterans across our state through the 25 Illinois Women Veteran Leaders of 2026. These remarkable women represent the strength, resilience, and continued impact of women who have served and who now lead in their communities, professions, and veteran advocacy efforts.

We also encourage women veterans to ensure their stories are preserved and shared by registering their service history with the Military Women's Memorial. By documenting their experiences, women veterans help ensure that the legacy of women's military service is recognized, remembered, and honored for generations to come. 100-Day Challenge to Prevent Homelessness

The Office to Prevent and End Homelessness (OPEH), in partnership with the Supportive Housing Providers Association (SHPA) and [RE!NSTITUTE](#), launched a 100-Day Challenge on homelessness prevention in late February 2026. A cohort of five communities from across the state (Lake, DuPage, Rockford, Springfield, and Macon Communities of Care (COCs)) will embark on a 100-Day Challenge to prevent homelessness in their local communities while also belonging to a state-wide movement. IDVA participates in the OPEH's Illinois Homeless Response Collaborative (IHRC) that supports these types of efforts aimed at preventing homelessness across Illinois. IDVA's Senior Policy Advisor, Hannah Bonecutter, was in attendance to learn more about how these COCs will design their 100-Day Challenge and the positive impact they may have on our homeless veterans across Illinois. Previous 100-Day Challenges in Illinois have supported veterans, youth, and people experiencing unsheltered homelessness. The 100-Day Challenge initiates cross-community networking and learning that can inform housing and homelessness policy and practices impacting our diverse Illinois population.
